Electives

Every pupil participates in two 50-minute Electives of their choice every week. Electives are like extracurricular clubs, but they are compulsory for all (there is a broad range of options) and they take place during the school day. Teachers are encouraged to offer Electives outside of their academic specialism to promote their wider interests and to share a different side of themselves with pupils.

Meet the Teacher

The purpose of our Meet the Teacher events is to:

- ✓ facilitate a face-to-face meeting between you and your child's teachers. We believe that meeting in person is really important when building a relationship, and much more valuable than a remote meeting, telephone call or email in the first instance;
- ✓ establish a constructive and trusting relationship between you and your child's teachers. We do this by affirming that you both have the same priorities and goals in mind for your child when it comes to their academic progress and wellbeing in this crucial phase of their education;
- ✓ share contact details and open up a transparent communication channel between you and your child's teachers. You can then communicate with one another about your child's academic progress and attitude to learning as and when it is appropriate to do so throughout the year, rather than at an arbitrary fixed point.





At Dawlish College we are proud advocates of our 5 principles for inclusion (from the paper published by the CST and Ambition Institute):



Dignity, not deficit

Differences are normal aspects of humanity and the education of all children should be characterised by dignity and high expectation.



Greater complexity merits greater expertise

All children deserve a high-quality education, and where extra support is needed, it should be expert in nature.



Different, but not apart

Encountering difference builds an inclusive society: as far as possible, all children should be able to grow up together.



Success in all its forms

Success takes many forms: we should value and celebrate a wide range of achievements, including different ways of participating in society.



Action at all levels

Change happens from the bottom-up as well as top-down, and everyone has the agency and a responsibility to act.







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
