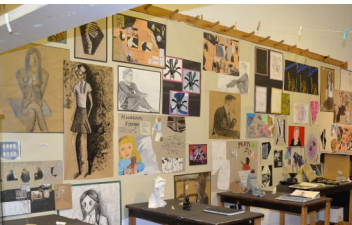

Results 2018

2018-19 saw the first cohort of students sit the new 9-1 science GCSEs with amazing success.

- 100% of separate science students achieved 3 GCSEs at grade 4 or above.
- 40% of students taking GCSE biology, chemistry and physics achieved a grade 9-7.
- 72% of students in the year group achieved 2 GCSEs at grade 4 or better.
- There were 11 grade 9 GCSEs awarded across the year group in science.

We are extremely proud of the results achieved by the students who showed great maturity in their attitude to learning and their approach to revision

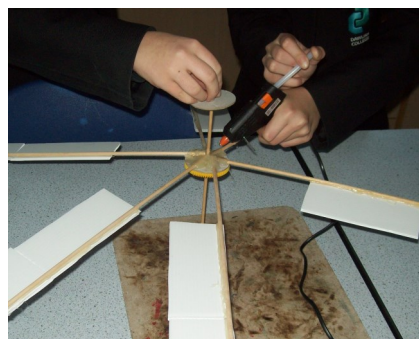
Science Department News

STEM Days

50 of our year 8 and 9 students took part in a South West Water STEM day aimed at bringing the National Curriculum to life. The students were set the challenge of building a water filtration system complete with working sensors. The students worked in teams and had to cost all aspects of their project with a view to bringing it to market. The students did an amazing job on the day and produced some innovative designs which they presented to the group at the end of the day



NLO Observatory

On Wednesday 28th November thirteen year 11 students took a trip out to visit the Norman Lockyer Observatory at the edge of Sidmouth to learn more about the universe, stars and other astronomical objects around us. The observatory is based on a hill to the east of Sidmouth and is close to the sea to prevent light pollution when observing the night sky, making it an ideal spot for stargazing. Sadly the weather was not on our side, and so the opportunity to use the telescopes was lost. Saying this, the NLO still had a lot to offer. Students were greeted with a range of historic artefacts taken from telescopes, space crafts and other scientific instruments used to observe the universe. Staff and students were both intrigued by the work of Sir Norman Lockyer, the founder of the observatory who we learnt was the first person to suggest that the element Helium existed when using spectroscopy to observe the corona (ring of light) around the moon during a solar eclipse. A tour around the site, visiting historic telescopes in a range of domes, ended in the planetarium where staff and students experienced a life-like clear night sky in which we were able to clearly see the constellations. David Strange, our host, told tales of how the Greeks came to name the constellations, as well as identifying stars, galaxies and other astronomical objects of importance to us. David left us with a challenge to try and spot a near passing comet in the upcoming weeks.

STEM Club

This year the STEM club have embarked on a challenge to produce a model for a renewable energy resource which could potentially be made on a larger scale to produce energy. The group decided to focus on producing wind generated electricity, making and testing model wind turbines. One group has been ambitious enough to make their turbines blades approximately 60 cm in length, giving them the extra challenge of making a mount which will hold their generator as well as not inhibit the rotation of their blades. Another group has produced a simple circuit which attaches to their generator to test the energy supplied by their turbine, the circuit was a success and was able to light an LED while the generator was turning. It is fantastic to see these students making great progress on their wind turbines and we look forward to seeing how the project evolves over the remainder of the year.
