In Art, Year 9 are currently working on a complex printing process known as Lino Colour Reduction. The students have created a design from a still life set up in in the art room. They have since developed their drawings into a 4 coloured lino design. Once this is com-

pleted, the design is then transferred onto the lino and each colour is carefully cut out once as they apply the separate colours. It's a very physical and mentally demanding process, one mistake and the design alters! So far the students are at the mid-way stage with two thirds of the colours already applied and they are doing a fantastic job! Well done to everyone for their hard work



and excellent focus! Meanwhile a regular group of year 7 students attend art club each week. Some do colouring whilst others work on their own artistic ideas and projects. All are free to use any materials, eat their lunch and work within the happy buzz of the department. Feel free to join us Thursdays Break 2 alternating between the two art rooms.

This academic year the Upper School year groups are participating in a range of different reward competitions, designed to reward students that show an outstanding attitude towards their lessons and make exceptional levels of progress. The top 15 students in each year group were invited on a trip go-karting at Raceworld Exeter. Camp Tanzania 2021

Our Camps International project was recently launched for any year 9 or 10 students who would like to get involved in the trip of a lifetime. The project supports fund raising to go on a 4 week trip to Tanzania in the summer of 2021

The expedition helps students understand the day to day challenges rural communities face, as they work on projects which transform communities and help them overcome significant issues they face including access to clean water, education and housing. It also increases students' self-worth helping them appreciate the impact just one person can have on the world.

Tanzania is home to tropical forests, mighty rivers, grassy savannahs and the Great Rift Valley. During the 4 week life-enhancing school expedition students will see some of the world's most spectacular wildlife including elephants, zebras, giraffes, big cats and monkeys as they visit one of the country's best wildlife areas. It has a diverse population, including the world famous red-robed Maasai tribe who live around the Tanzania – Kenya border. Students will meet the inspiring Mamas of the local villages as they are welcomed into the community and learn some of their traditional skills.

There is also an opportunity to take part in a 3 day trek through the vibrant tropical rainforest of the Usambara Mountains. The unique climate of these mountains is unlike other Tanzanian ranges, creating a cloud forest which make it one of the world's biodiversity hotspots. The mountains are home to an exceptional assortment of plants and wildlife.

Three students who took part last year agree that it was an amazing experience and well worth all the efforts of fund-raising. One parent wrote: "*My daughter had the most amazing, life changing experience. The fund raising was a challenge at times but well worth it. She fell in love with Africa and it has given her some WOW moments!"*

La Galette Des Rois

During the month of January, the MFL team have been celebrating Epiphany with the French traditional cake <u>"La Galette des Rois"</u> (King's Cake). This is made with almond paste ("frangipane": ground almonds, sugar, butter and eggs) encased with puff pastry – délicieux!

"La Galette des Rois' celebrates the **Epiphany** (when the three kings visited baby Jesus). You can eat the cake a few days before and after the 6th January and it can be found in most bakeries in France during the month of January! According to tradition, the 'Galette des Rois' was baked to "draw the kings" to the Epiphany.



A figurine called "**la fève**", is hidden in the cake before baking. Originally, "la fève" was a broad bean, but they were replaced in 1870 by a variety of figurines made of porcelain. To make sure that giving out the slices of cake is fair, it is traditional for the youngest person to go under the table and call out in turn who should get each slice. The person who finds the *fève* in their slice becomes King or Queen for the day and has the opportunity of bossing the rest of the family about! A couple of paper crowns are included with each cake to crown the "King or Queen" who must then choose their partner to be Queen/King.



In Ms Marc's year 9 class **Lucy** got the charm and chose **Emily** as her queen. **Grace**, being the youngest in the class, got to say who got which slice. In Ms Noble's year 10 class **Isobel** got the charm and chose **Callie** as her queen. **Lily** (an August baby) had the important job of deciding who was given each slice! **Ms Marc** also made a Galette for the faculty and **Mr Waterworth** was king once again and chose **Ms Lithgow** to be his queen.
