Amy is a past winner of the Rotary National Young Chef competition, which is particularly inspiring for students. Lucy, our winner, was presented with a magnificent trophy gifted by Malcolm Protheroe from the Mount Pleasant Inn, Dawlish Warren. Well done to everyone involved!

Year 9 French students have been busy learning all about going on holiday to France and, of course, eating out! To revise the unit they combined their linguistic and acting talents to create and perform a scene in a French restaurant. Madame Noble was very impressed by the clarity of their performances, and many included lots of new language structures which they have been learning. Bringing languages to life is what we are about here in Dawlish College and our students demonstrated brilliantly that they could do just that! The winning team were Eva, Monique and Isobel.

Following this, the students who had looked at French recipes put their culinary skills to the test for a Dawlish College "Bake Off". Students chose between La Mousse au Chocolat and La tarte aux pommes. Students enjoyed being judges and giving scores for "la presentation," "le goût" and "la texture." 4 very excited (and nervous) Dawlish College students travelled to Barnstaple to take part in a regional MFL Speaking Competition, held at Pilton Community College. They had to deliver a presentation in French or Spanish to a room of nearly 100 people - no mean feat!
Having listened to talented linguists all day from KS3-KS5 (giving presentations in more than 5 different languages) we hope they will be inspired to continue with their love of languages.
We are very proud of their achievement - they came away with a certificate and a goodie bag but, more importantly, memories of day they will never forget!. Well done Mia, Gina, Lucy and Alicia-Jane.

Years 5 and 6 students from Exminster Community Primary School have been attending STEM workshops here at Dawlish College. In previous weeks, they have designed their own Space Hotel logo using a CAD (computer aided design) programme called 2D Design and exported these to a laser cutter. These designs were then made into wooden stamps. In addition to this they baked biscuits and used their stamps to imprint their Space Hotel logos. Last week students made their own Alien Bug using electronic components, engineering them to walk. In science, the children have been testing the strength of reinforced
 concrete. They have planned and carried out several experiments to see which concrete mix can hold the greatest weight. One group managed to hang nearly 6 kg before the piece of concrete gave way.

A huge thank you to all you who supported our Book Fair! We had a huge variety of new books, all of which were half price or less, plus stationery and posters. During break times students helped staff with the selling of books and other items and we would like to say a huge thank you to all our student volunteers. With their help and your support we raised just under $£ 380$, giving us a commission of $10 \%$ to add to our library purchases.
