The transition group is a helpful group as it builds our confidence – Archie


I am learning more things every day and it is all fun – I am also getting help with my reading using Lexia – Joey

AQA Feedback: Key Points

LITERATURE

- If two characters are mentioned in the question, both must be mentioned in the answer but, as with the extract/whole text balance, do not have to be treated equally.
- Planning answers always helps
- Making links across the text is the key to higher grades

LANGUAGE

- In Paper 1 Q3 has improved but need to avoid narrating the extract. Key question is "How does reading about this, at this point, add to my understanding of the text as a whole?"
- Terminology such as flashback and foreshadow are technical enough
- Paper 2: Question 2 this year referred to the concrete item of the surfboards – it does not have to be a question on thoughts and feelings
- Paper 2 Question 2 can be about similarities as well as differences – avoid analysis
- Paper 2 Question 4 does not have to be the same focus as Question 2 and we need to improve the focus on perspectives and HOW the methods are used to present them

AQA said AO2 needed improving generally – ask HOW is the method USED by the writer for WHAT purpose?
